Allergic contact dermatitis, also known as Type IV hypersensitivity, is an allergic response and is caused by skin absorption of chemicals in a product. 1,2 An allergic reaction can occur from one of the chemical additives used in the glove that are not latex proteins, such as accelerators. Signs and symptoms of the allergic reaction include a red, raised, and palpable area with bumps, sores, and/or cracks in the skin.
